Profile of General Demographics Characteristics 2000 Glen Rock Borough, US Census Bureau



Executive Summary

The Methodology used in projecting enrollments is the recommended method of the NJ Department of Education, known as Cohort Survival. The NJ DOE form of report is in the Appendix.

General Population includes those in the 2.7 square mile Borough of Glen Rock, in Bergen County, which has a year 2000 population of 11,546 people according to the US Census. The public school system has a student population of just over 2,470 students in 6 schools.

Population by Age Group from 1990 to 2000, shows increasing Pre-school and School-age populations, up 24% and 29% respectively. Childbearing age population decreased by a significant 17%, in apparent contradiction to the other strong gains.

Birth Rates for the recent three years have averaged 137 births per and is the rate used to project Live Births beyond 2004, the last year for which data is available. That rate is down 25 births per year from the prior three year average of 162; and further decline is anticipated due to the decrease in population in the Child-bearing Age group.

Housing Permits in Glen Rock have averaged 3 permits per year in the last six years. The single "approved" sub-division is the Kara Homes project, which at 18 units will add only 4 school age children.

Residential Resales include 1122 homes in the last five years. That is 27.8% of all existing houses! And the rate of re-sales has increased from 180 in 2001 to 270 in 2005. Since the birth rate is declining, the enrollment increase can only be due to in-migration of families with more children than those who are selling their homes.

Historic Enrollments in Glen Rock have increased over the last six years by 241 students or 10.7% from 2233 to 2474 students.

Enrollment Projections establish a district-wide decline of 118 students over the next 5 years.

Elementary grades PreK to Gr 5 will decrease by 146 students from a current level of 1147 to a year 2011 count of 1001.

Grades 6 to 8 enrollments which peaked at 617 students in 2005, will decrease to 602 in 2011.

High School enrollments will peak at 781 students in year 2008, 55 students higher than the current level, and subsequently stabilize around 750 students.



Population in Glen Rock Borough, which peaked at 13,000 in 1970 has declined and rebounded to 11,546, while the school enrollments increased to over 2,400.

The period from 1990 to 2000 saw a 17% decrease in the Childbearing Age group and a 29% increase in the School Age population.

Rapidly increasing rates of existing home sales has been driving the recent enrollment increases.

Significantly decreasing Birth Rates will counter the in-migration increases to the point of a future enrollment decline.

Enrollments which grew by 241 students in the last six years are projected to decrease by 118 students in the next five years, to a new district-wide level of 2356 students in year 2011.



Profile: Township

Glen Rock is a borough in Bergen County, New Jersey, United States. It is on the southwestern side of the northeastern most county, and lies only 18 miles northwest of New York City.

As of the United States 2000 Census, the borough population was 11,546. Glen Rock is ranked in 47th place among the Highest-income places in the United States with a population of at least 10,000.

Glen Rock was formed on September 12, 1894 from portions of Ridgewood Township "that being the year the county went crazy on boroughs". When Glen Rock was incorporated in 1894, two railroad lines through the borough carried fruits and vegetables from local farms to the markets in Paterson, N.J., and Suffern, N.Y. The railroad is now a drawing card for the many residents who work in Manhattan.

According to the United States Census Bureau, the borough has a total area of 7.1 km² (2.7 mi²). 7.0 km² (2.7 mi²) of it is land and 0.37% is water.

Unlike most suburban towns whose names have little or nothing to do with reality, Glen Rock was actually settled around an enormous rock left by retreating glaciers in a small valley (glen). From a 1985 New York Times article, "Glen Rock is named for a 570-ton boulder, believed to have been deposited by a glacier, that stands at the northern end of Rock Road, the town's main street. Called Pamackapuka, or Stone from Heaven, by the Delaware Indians, it served as a base for Indian signal fires and later as a trail marker for colonists".

Glen Rock's governing body consists of a mayor and six council members elected at large on a staggered basis in partisan elections. Two council members are elected each year for three-year terms and the Mayor is elected to a four-year term of office. The Mayor is the Chief Executive Officer for the Borough. Glen Rock operates using a Mayor / Council within the Borough form of government with the annual appointment of a full time professional borough administrator who is the Chief Administrative Officer of the Borough, responsible to the Mayor and Council. Glen Rock is in the Fifth Congressional District and is part of New Jersey's 35th Legislative District.



Glen Rock Borough was organized in 1894, when it seceded from Ridgewood, in part due to the proposed locations of schools.

Glen Rock Borough is a 2.7 square mile municipality with a year 2000 population of 11,546.

Profile: School District

Until 1894, the children from towns in the area attended a one-room school at Ackerman Avenue and Rock Road in Glen Rock. As enrollment grew, school officials proposed building a new school closer to the center of the unincorporated township of Ridgewood. The Dutch-American vegetable farmers of Glen Rock - which at that time had fewer than 100 homes and 600 residents - thought that would be too long a walk for their children. They decided to have a school of their own and seceded from Ridgewood. By 1985 Glen Rock has three public elementary schools and a combined junior-senior high school, plus St. Catherine's, a Roman Catholic elementary school.

Today, the Glen Rock Public Schools serve students in kindergarten through twelfth grade. The district consists of six schools which include four K-5 elementary schools with 225-335 students each, Glen Rock Middle School with 600 students in grades 6-8, and Glen Rock High School which has an enrollment of 700+ students in grades 9-12. The high school consistently places in the top 50 public schools in the state. Over 90% of students who attend Glen Rock High School go on to a two-year or four-year college.



The Glen Rock Public School District operates a K-12 educational program for over 2,400 students in 6 schools.

Profile: Parochial School

The single parochial school, now known as Academy of Our Lady continues to be affiliated with St. Catherine's Roman Catholic church located in Glen Rock as well as Our Lady of Mount Carmel in neighboring Ridgewood.

The school provides education for grades PreK-8 and has an enrollment of 465 students. In conversation with Mrs. Patricia Keenaghan, Principal of the Academy of Our Lady, the consultant was informed that supported by a strong marketing campaign the Academy enrollment has been stable (plus or minus 6 students) for the last three years, and that the enrollment is anticipated to remain the same. No expanded or enhanced recruitment programs are planned at the pre-school or K-8 levels.

Approximately 88% of the graduating 8th graders go on to attend parochial High School, within the greater Bergen County area. Specifically, the 2005 graduating class is attending 11 different parochial high schools. Enrollments at the parochial school have remained stable for 3 years. No changes are planned which would impact enrollment.






Demographics and Population Trends

As of the census of 2000, there were 11,546 people, 3,977 households, and 3,320 families residing in the borough. There were 4,024 housing units.

There were 3,977 households out of which 43.8% had children under the age of 18 living with them, 75.1% were married couples living together, 6.8% had a female householder with no husband present, and 16.5% were non-families. 14.7% of all households were made up of individuals and 9.2% had someone living alone who was 65 years of age or older. The average household size was 2.89 and the average family size was 3.22.

The median income for a household in the borough was \$104,192, and the median income for a family was \$111,280. The per capita income for the borough was \$45,091. About 2.1% of families and 2.4% of the population were below the poverty line.

Population peaked in Glen Rock in1970 at 13,011... Population declined to 11,497 by 1980, and ... has increased to 11,546 by 2000, only 89% of the peak year.






Population Trends County & State Comparisons

Population growth and decline in Glen Rock mirrors that of Bergen County, but not of New Jersey.

Both Bergen County and Glen Rock saw declining populations in the 80's. Growth in Bergen County and Glen Rock in the 90's made up for the losses in the 80's.

Population has grown, at a continuously increasing rate in New Jersey.

Both Bergen County, and Glen Rock evidenced declining population in the 80's and moderate growth in the 90's.






Population by Age Group

Population by Age Group from 1990 to 2000 in the Township, reveals important findings. Population increased significantly in the Pre-School (24.8%) and School Age (29%)groups.

Childbearing age population (ages 22-39) decreased by 17.5%, or an actual count of a very significant 529 fewer persons. This is significant as the general population grew by nearly 6%, and is counter-intuitive to the increases in pre-school and school-age children.

Adult ages 40-64 evidenced a very significant 15% increase or 544 persons, while ages 65+ decreased by 5% or 90 persons.



The Childbearing age group, in the 10 year census period from 1990 to 2000, experienced a 529 person decline. This is a 17% decrease compared with 6% growth overall.

At the same time, the number of School age children increased by 547 children, a 29% increase.

Further analysis shows Pre School ages increased by 191 children or nearly 25%.

The number of babies born to families who reside in the district is a significant factor effecting enrollment projections. Birth Rates from "5 years earlier" are used for the Birth to Kindergarten survival ratios in the standard method. For example, the first school year in the historic data is 2001-02 and uses year 1996 for the Birth:K calculation of that survival ratio. With that understanding, actual and projected births are presented here for review.

Birth rates have fluctuated between 178 and 132 per year over the last 10 years for which data is available. Over the 6 years 1999-03, the birth rate has been declining around an average of 158 births.


Trend analysis of the period 1999-03 indicates a possible decrease of the birth rate as shown by the green line in the graphic below. However the standard projection methodology uses the average.

Births data for years 2005 and 2006 are not yet available for use in the standard Cohort Survival projection. Enrollments are projected using the 3-year average of 137 for these unknown years of birth data.

Actual Live Births are used for years 1995-2004.

A 3-year average of 137 is used to project Live Births for years beyond 2004, which data are not yet available, and which are the basis for future Kindergarten projections in the standard projection.

The prior 3-year average is 162 births per year, 25 more per year than the most recent 3-year average.

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Cohort Survival Methodology

Cohort Survival is the name given to the method of projecting enrollments which is most often recommended by the New Jersey Department of Education. Cohort Survival projections are based on historic enrollment and birth data in the individual school district and incorporate six years of demographic trends. They are considered very reliable in districts where trends are expected to continue, without significant change in housing or birth rates.

"Cohort" is the name given to the common groups of children originally born in a given year and progressing, together, through the school system, one grade level to the next. Survival ratios refer to the number of students from one year and grade level who "survive to" or enter the next grade level the following year.

For example, in the sample partial table in the side bar, historic enrollments show 301 students in a First Grade in year 2003-04, following a 246 student Kindergarten in year 2002-03. This yields a Kindergarten to First Grade survival ratio of 1.224 (or $301 \div 246$).

Similar calculations are made for "survivors" from Births Five Years Earlier to Kindergarten, and for each and every grade level transition in each and every year of historical enrollments which are used. In general, six years of historic data will yield five Survival Ratios for each grade level change, Birth to K, K to 1, 1 to 2, etc. The **Average** Survival Ratio is then calculated for each grade level change.

Live Births data is also important. Official data is currently available from the NJ Department of Health only to year 2004. Birth data through year 2006 are utilized in the standard projection. Hence, years 2005-2006 are estimates using the average. These are used in the standard and extended projections.

The projections use the current school year 2005-06 enrollments as a base year. The Averaged Cohort Survival Ratios are applied to those base year enrollments and to the actual and estimated births, and projected into the next year, one grade level higher.

Is the standard projection acceptable? Will trends stay the same?



Residential Permitting And New Subdivisions

The six year average of building permits for the period 2001-05 is 3 units per year, and is a level used in further analysis of enrollments as we look at the future of residential development.

A telephone interview on October 16, 2006 with Nancy Piller, Planning Board Secretary, documented only one recent subdivision approval with no other known planned subdivisions under consideration.

The approved subdivision is for Kara Homes for 18 market rate Townhouses (all 2-Bedroom) and two Low and Moderate Income units (1Bedroom and 3-Bedroom). Kara Homes declared bankruptcy in mid-October 2006. For purposes of this report, it is assumed that Kara will reorganize and move forward with the project or sell it to a developer who will move forward with it.

That project, utilizing Children by Unit Type multipliers derived from the 2000 U S Census and confirmed by the beta-level report from Rutgers Urban Planning Department is for 4 children to be generated, not a particularly significant number in a 2400+ student district.

No adjustment to the standard projection, based on new residential development, is warranted.


Demographic Study



Existing Homes Residential Sales

Sales of existing homes in Glen Rock have been increasing about 25 units per year over the last several years from 180 in 2001 to a high of 270 in 2005. Trend analysis would project 294 re-sales in 2006 for which records are not yet available.

In 5 years 1122 homes have been resold. This is during a period when district enrollments increased about 250 students from 2470 in 2001 to 2233 in 2005.

Since the birth rate is declining, the enrollment increase can only be due to in-migration of families with more children than those who are selling their homes.

Anecdotal evidence is that more seniors are leaving the area than was evident from 1990 to 2000 (about 9 per year) and are being replaced by families with children. These must be families with existing children since Birth Rate continues to decline. Older "established" families can more afford the premium housing prices in Glen Rock This scenario is supported by the average grade level enrollment in the Middle School at 200 in comparison to the Elementary school at only 175 per grade level. While elementary enrollment is stable, both middle school and high school enrollments have risen.



The increase in existing home sales is a continuously increasing trend, the impact which is accounted for in the standard Cohort Survival analysis.


No adjustments are required to the standard projection, based on existing home sales.

However, it is in-migration from these existing home sales that has caused the recent increase in school enrollment. Enrollment in the school district will decrease from a six-year historic high of 2474 students per year in the current school year to a projected Enrollment of 2356 in school year 2011-12

Historic growth of nearly 50 students per year will reverse to a projected decline of 24 students per year.

The recent downturn in the residential resale market, nationwide and in New Jersey, supports this projection; as well as a declining birth rate.

Enrollment decline is most obvious in the average grade level sizes which in the Middle and High School will remain stable, while declining from 229 to 200 in each elementary grade level.



PreK - Gr 12

Glen Rock Borough school enrollments will decrease from a current level of 2474 students to a projected year 2011 level of 2356, a loss of 118 students or 5%.

High School will gain 27 students while the elementary schools will lose 146 students.




Elementary School enrollments in the historic period were stable at \pm 10 students around an average of 1143 students.

Elementary enrollments are projected to decline to 1001 students, a decline of 146 students or about 24 per grade level.

Of these, 10 will be PreK Special Education students and 15 will be K-Gr 5 Self-Contained Special Education students.

Grades PreK to Gr 5 combined enrollments will decrease from a current level of 1,147 to a projection period low of 1001 students in 2011-12.


Children in standard K-Gr 5 classrooms will decrease from 184 per grade level in the current year to 162 per grade level in the final year of the projection.



Grades 6-8 enrollments grew by 66 students over 5 years before declining by 16 students in the current year...

Enrollments are projected to continue a slight decline to 573 students before returning to current levels at the end of the projection.

Grades 6-8 enrollments which peaked at 617 students in the historic period, will decline past the current level of 601 to a low of 573 students before returning to a level of 602.



Enrollments are projected to continue to grow by an additional 55 students over the next two years to 781 students before decreasing to \pm 750 students.



Gr 9-12

Grades 9-12 enrollments, which peaked at 726 students in the historic period, will peak at 781 in the projected period, before declining to 753 students.
